John's Gospel tells us it was still dark when Mary Magdalene arrived at the tomb and found it empty. I love that detail—that Easter began in the shadows, well before sunrise. Some months ago, a friend challenged me to consider a time of renewal for us all in 2020, which will be our 14th year together. This took me by surprise, but I now think it is God's invitation.

I gathered a small group of leaders to help me listen to the Spirit. I asked them: Could this be a source of fresh energy and joy for all of us? They were very enthusiastic, so I took the proposal to Session in March. I asked for permission to write a grant proposal to the Clergy Renewal Program of the Lilly Endowment. They encouraged me to do so.

I submitted my 20 page proposal in mid- April. This is how Lilly describes the program and its purpose: "Clergy Renewal Programs provide an opportunity for pastors to step away briefly from the persistent obligations of daily parish life and to engage in a period of renewal and reflection. Renewal periods are not vacations but times for intentional exploration and reflection, for drinking again from God's life-giving waters, for regaining enthusiasm and creativity for ministry". Grant recipients will be notified in late August, so there will be more to say about this then.

The Session startled me by encouraging me to plan this 14-week undertaking, and told me we should pursue this season of renewal whether or not the grant is approved.

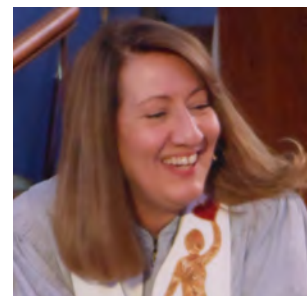
I am beginning to share this dream with you, because I know that if we prepare for it together, this time of reflection and exploration can be used by God to deepen our relationship and refresh us. We have a year to get ready: this Season of Renewal will begin the week after Easter next year.

I will tell you much more about what I envision, but my core longing is to spend some intentional time 'among the trees' (see poem), and consider ways that we might seek God's message for us in "the Big Book of Creation". This is consistent with things we have long loved as a congregation (Family Camp, backpack trips, etc.) and also with current practices (camp for FOC kids, and rock-climbing with LifeSkillz.)

Upon my return, I imagine we will share our joys and discoveries. In my imagination, all of us would feel more confident in our baptismal identity: that we too have been called "into the world to go easy, to be filled with light, and to shine."

LifeSkillz Celebration

Our first foray into the LifeSkillz program at San Bernardino High School was in January of 2014. We invited sophomore students to an experimental meeting (and bribed them with pizza.) We asked them to take a chance on us, and on a weekly breakfast group designed to build friendships and support students in their educational and personal goals. We planned to 'test drive' the group for one semester, then evaluate and consider next steps.

In May, when we reminded them we had 2 more weeks of meetings before the end of school, the students said to us, "Wait—we're not going to stop meeting just because school is out? Are we??"

The adult leaders looked at one another in alarm and said, "No, of course not!" We planned a pool party on the spot, and LifeSkillz was officially permanent. We walked with those kids through their graduation day in 2016, and celebrated

them in worship on a Sunday morning. We gave them small gifts and we promised to come for them whenever they might call. It was an astonishing celebration of how God can do 'far beyond all that we ask or imagine'. We are still connected to several of those original LifeSkillz kids, and we have come to know and love dozens more in the intervening years.

In a few weeks, we will again celebrate graduates. We have several seniors—some who have been interns, some whom we have known for years, some we've seen less frequently as activities compete for their time.

On Sunday May 26 (the Sunday of Memorial Day Weekend) we will recognize them in worship. We do this to delight in them, and so that the wider congregation gets a glimpse of their goodness. We do this so they will know, as clearly as we can say it, that they

We do this to celebrate education in our community, and students who are beating the odds by graduating. Some of them will be the first in their families to head off to college in the fall. This is cause for great rejoicing, since it was our original aim: to help kids complete their high school education, and seek to use their gifts for good in the world.

Mostly, though, we do it to honor God. Like writers of the psalms we gather and say to one another: "Look at what God has done! O God, you brought about things we hardly dared to dream of! You have made friendships and tenderness where before there were strangers and mistrust. You have moved in our hearts and worked in our neighborhood and congregation to bring new life and deeper understanding and fresh joy! You have called women and men to make breakfast and bring snacks and demonstrate caring. You have called us to befriend these kids and believe in them, and, much to our surprise, you have changed US in the process!"

Be sure to join us on Sunday the 26th to show your support for our seniors, and to delight in what God has done!

Why Are They Wearing Those Atrocious Vests?

Many of you have asked why are the Ushers wearing those bright yellow reflective vests.....many people have wondered.....Is Judy Steppins performing some type of community service at our church?, Is Judy Brewer moonlighting as a crossing guard? or did Dave Thomas just miserably fail fashion design school? Well the answer to all these questions is no but the vests do serve an important part for our safety team and our congregation.

An easy method of identification for visitors to our church: We occasionally have visitors to our church that have a question and the vests provide an easy means of who to ask if someone has a question.

A deterrent to people who are looking to take advantage of our congregation: Our Ushers are frequently patrolling the grounds during church service. Just the visual presence of our vests has made several suspicious people take notice of us and walk away.

An easy means for us to give directions in the event of an emergency: In the unlikely event our Ushers need to give emergency directions to our congregation, we're easy to identify and it's easy for the Ushers to visually locate each other.

They hold our two way radios: The vests were selected because of pockets that conveniently hold our two way radios for easy access.

A way for us to visually communicate with Sandy and Wendy: We currently do not have a way for the Ushers to verbally communicate an issue to Sandy or Wendy during the service. The vests provide an important way to visually alert Sandy and Wendy that we may be needing to deal with a situation such as escorting a disruptive visitor out of the sanctuary. In addition, Sandy wants the Ushers to wear the vests for the reasons listed above.

I hope this helps in clarifying why our Ushers need these essential vests. If anyone is interested in joining our safety team, please let me know. It's a fun way to see what happens behind the scenes during church service.

Session Highlights -- Wednesday, April 24, 2019

Pastor Lamb opened the meeting with prayer and read from John 20:19 when Jesus reveals himself to the disciples following his crucifixion. He breaths on them and says, "Receive the Holy Spirit." We, too, have been given the Holy Spirit and will prepare to receive this great gift Pentecost Sunday, June 9th.

The consent agenda was approved. Items of note include attendance at 2019 Easter service was 230, compared to 271 in 2018. Worship Committee is inviting anyone who would like a copy (or copies) of the older blue hymnals to take them. They will be available in Fellowship Hall following worship. Deacons report distribution of food bags in 2019 at 402 double, 39 single, 500 in the office, and 74 homeless. If you are interested in helping with this outreach effort, please contact any deacon. Buildings and Grounds shared sanctuary roof repairs are completed at a cost of \$72,000. To date, one offer has been made for the property at 1875 North "D" but was far below the asking price. Clerk of Session, Amy Smith, along with office staff, is working with an accountant on a financial review of our current practices.

A request was submitted and approved to continue the Building and Landscape Internship Program for Summer 2019. Six interns and one supervisor will continue working on the church grounds and other projects.

There was a general discussion of FPCSB's use of technology—is there more we can do with technology and do all staff have the needed equipment and programs.

There was a brief discussion regarding FPCSB members knowing who the elders are, their function, and where each is focusing on church needs and issues. Upcoming issues of the newsletter will highlight each committee, its members and mission. In the meantime, here is a listing of committees and chairs:

Life in Earthen Vessels

There is a place in the epistles where Paul tells a young church that they carry the treasure of Christ and the grace of God in their fragile human bodies- he compares them to 'earthen vessels'- humble, and breakable, and impermanent. The great gift of God's presence is what gives these clay jars great beauty and preciousness.

I have been thinking about this because it reminds me of our sanctuary. It is made of impermanent things: brick and mortar, cushions and pews, glass and symbols we treasure. And recently, it has become leaky: showing us it's impermanent and fragile nature.

Though ours is a high quality roof, it is 40

feet up (no shade, ever!) and in our desert climate (sun! sun! sun!) it has deteriorated pretty rapidly. This winter it began to leak in earnest, soaking carpet and some pew cushions, damaging paint near the 2nd tall window from the back, damaging the wood and finish on some pews, and threatening more.

The Session knew we needed to act. Bids were solicited, and the best one chosen. Work could not begin until 2 weeks of sunshine were anticipated. They started early April. On the weekdays, (when most of you were not here) Solar panels were removed with care and stored, the roof was repaired (it took about a week of workmen up on ladders) and then panels were replaced.

This was extraordinarily expensive, about \$73,000.00 all told.

I am writing to make sure the whole church family and our friends know what we've been navigating. I also want to invite you to help heal this financial blow if you are able.

This imperfect and impermanent structure holds our common life, and gives us a space to encounter the treasure of the presence of God. And so we cherish it, and tend it with care. If you are in a position to help offset these costs, it would be wonderful to have your help with this. Thanks be to God for our spiritual home.
