Pastor's Perspective...

Unexpected Joy

Let's begin with joy- as this is always where our faith begins: with the love of God which is more than we ask or even imagine. The Leonard scholarship committee deputized Cyndi Pringle and Lynda Savage to take a look at the Memo written when the fund was established. It has not been updated since 1986 (on a dot-matrix printer...) and we knew there were several ways we were out of compliance with the original document (for example, the Memo suggests we keep the donor anonymous – but we've been telling Eadie's story each June for at least a decade, and it suggests a member of the Leonard family sit on the committee and help advise as we select the scholars-But this has not been possible for many years).



What Cyndi and Lynda (and also Phil!) discovered on a close reading is that once scholarships have been given, if there is additional money in the fund (above and beyond the 100K principal) it may be spent on "capital improvements". Turns out there is about \$380K in the fund, so we have found the money to pay the \$70,000 of roofing costs! This is a huge relief, and also a source of great tenderness and joy for me. Bill and Bobbie continue to bless and shelter and love us- or perhaps the Spirit of God continues to love us, and Bobbie and Bill are channels of that Mercy. In any case: what a marvelous thing Bill and Jim Huffstutler crafted 35 years ago! Hoping to find ways to celebrate this and share the joy, and invite others to continue to invest in the beauty and welcome of this place, planted where the needs are so great.

Child Care Center Staff Offer Us Their Gifts by LYNETTE Duclos ADELSON

1 Corinthians 12:7-11 To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

The gifts of the Spirit given to this congregation include wisdom and knowledge. First Presbyterian, San Bernardino has always attracted and encouraged educators! We share this gift tangibly with our support of education of the infants in our child care center through those receiving Leonard Scholarships for college. We support students, families, institutions and teachers. I'd like to remind you of a few of the teachers we support and to whom we owe a great debt as we seek to live our mission in this neighborhood.

First Presbyterian Child Care Center opened in 1991. Because those who work in early childhood education carry huge responsibility for very little pay, most child care centers experience high teacher burnout and turnover. (continued on next page)

It is common that a three year old would have had half a dozen or more teachers in those first bonding years. Not so at FPCCC. One of the most impressive and unusual qualities of our center is that our teachers stay. And stay. Children who meet Carly and Lolita at six weeks of age delight in hugging them as the children move off to kindergarten.

Shortly after we opened, **Donna Bacon** brought her daughters for child care as she and her husband looked for new jobs. It wasn't long before Donna's love of teaching young children was rekindled and she returned to the career she had trained for by joining the FPCCC staff. She has been part of that staff since 1995! Donna teaches



the older three year olds and has the special intuitive vision of seeing the whole child and addressing that child's physical, emotional and cognitive needs.

Lolita Santiago got her Master's degree in the Philippines and brought her education, her gentle spirit, her dedication to order and cleanliness and her love of babies to FPCCC in 1996. FPCCC didn't serve infants at that time so Lolita worked with our Toddler Option program. She was a big influence and an even bigger help in the planning, licensing and start-up of the Infant Program. For the last twenty years Lolita has served this congregation and the youngest of God's children with tender care.

Christina Balog had taught at St. Anne's preschool for 17 years when they closed their doors. She filled out applications at every church related child care center in the area. Chris took jobs at several and was unhappy with the leadership, staffing and care given. When she was offered the job of teaching the two year old class at FPCCC she was hesitant. She had never done potty training and was leery of another church related center. When Chris began in 2003 she fell in love with the bright, spacious classrooms, the helpful staff and the congregational support. One of Chris' special gifts is her deep faith. She stops at the chapel at Holy Rosary many evenings to pray for the children in her care and for their families.

Sally Earp was still in high school at SBHS in 2000 when she became the aide and then the lead teacher of our After School Program. She brought stability and creativity to the lives of children who would have spent their afternoons alone or with older siblings. Sally eventually became the pre-kindergarten assistant and then teacher even as she got her degree from CSUSB. Sally thinks outside the box and tailors class time to fit the needs and personality of her class. She recognizes the huge difference between a classroom of children who have been in child care since birth and love reading and art and one filled with those who are leaving home for the first time and have abundant energy and 'feelings'! Sally was the FPCCC Assistant Director, in addition to her teaching, for several years. She was an excellent listener for the rest of the staff and carried questions and concerns to the Director. When Sally became FPCCC Director in 2016 she inherited a center that had almost completely changed from one where stay-at-home moms brought their children for half day enrichment programs to one where most of the enrollees were on a county or state payment program and all children came full days. She inherited a center in a city and neighborhood that was in tough financial times. Sally continues to teach the pre-kindergarten class and do all of the administrative work required by the state and the food program. She does all of this with creativity, alertness to needs, calm and steadiness.

Carly Earp didn't join the staff until 2004! In the fifteen years that she has worked at FPCCC she has done a bigger variety of jobs and worked crazier hours than any other staff member. She is the FPCCC cook, has worked in the office and in every classroom. Carly left us for awhile to get her degree at CSU Monterey Bay. She returned with new ideas, the ability to teach sign language to babies and to educate the staff about new techniques and studies in early childhood education. Carly brings a love of music to the classroom. Infant dance parties are not unusual! She also makes sure that the children in her care spend time in nature. You will see infants and toddlers riding in the giant stroller (donated years ago by the Bolin family) or walking around the campus enjoying breezes, trees, flowers and birds. Another of Carly's gifts is the gentle, subtle, loving way she teaches parents. Sharing her techniques, asking questions, texting or emailing photos during the day and making sure each parent knows that they are the most important person in their child's life make time at home and time at FPCCC flow smoothly for each child.

Yes, this congregation has been given gifts and has used those gifts generously so that the fruits of the Spirit who gave them are visible! Thanks be to God and to the teachers who make this mission possible.

Galatians 5:22b-23a the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

Summer at First Presbyterian Church of San Bernardino

As I am writing this, we have just finished Hymn Sing Sunday. We sang with joy hymns chosen by members, randomly selected by Music Director Curtiss Allen from slips of paper in a hat, lovingly prepped by Rebecca Allen. We sang new hymns and old, hymns we sing frequently and ones we rarely hear. We welcomed the morning, gathered at the river, and were called to act with justice. It was a surprising and joyful morning, followed by cake to celebrate Pastor Sandy's summer birthday and ice cream from the deacons.

I have the slips of paper from the hat, so if your song was not selected this morning, expect that it might show up in our summer worship (though you have to come every week to hear all the songs).

As our summer season of Ordinary Time continues, we will see the work of the people. Through July, choir members will offer their solo or special group gifts of song each week as the choir enjoys a Summer Sabbath. We are grateful to these musicians who offer their gifts.

We met in the Fellowship Hall this morning so that we could sit near one another as we sang together. We will be back in the sanctuary for the remainder of July and then move into the Fellowship Hall for August 4-September 1. This cuts our cooling bill as we heat only one (smaller) space and allows us to have some "summer experiments" in seating.

In August, choir will resume with Summer Choir. There will be no Thursday evening rehearsals. If you would like a chance to sing choral music, come at 9:30 to rehearse with the choir and sing in worship that morning. There is no commitment required. You may come 1, 2, 3, or 4 times. Come sing in the summer! Come with your family. Middle and High School youth are encouraged to try this out.

The month of July also offers a chance to hear different voices in worship.

July 7: I will be preaching and Stephanie Fletcher will offer the gift of song. We will celebrate the sacrament of communion.

July 14: The Reverend Rob Stewart will preach. Rob is a retired Presbyterian pastor who lives in the desert. Kathy Showman will offer the gift of song. After worship, we will break bread together with the Deacon's Potluck and hear our guest speaker.

July 21: Pastor Emeritus, the Reverend Jim Huffstutler, will preach. The Riverside Threshold Choir (with member Mary Bolaños) will sing.

July 28: Pastor Sandy Tice returns and will lead worship while the Reverend Brucer Meyer will preach. Amy Gano will offer the gift of music.

Summer is a time to try new things and hear new voices. It is a chance for the people to continue to work together to bring our worship to God. It is a time when we travel and experience other things, but also come back refreshed and with fresh eyes to see and ears to hear. As your commissioned local pastor, it is my privilege to see the work of the people and the work of the spirit alive in our community each day. It is a blessing and I am grateful.


