

This ordinary time is gifted with days,


Passing Ordinary Time ks of mundane grace


This service will be a summary, a chance to see the whole joyous and powerful story of the Christian faith made visible in an hour! Come and join us.


Kerygma


Have you ever wondered what the group that meets every Friday morning in our church library is all about? It has a peculiar name, Kerygma, which, among Biblical scholars, has come to mean the core of the early church's oral tradition about Jesus. Well, this group of women began years ago while using the Kerygma Bible studies. After finishing most of those we began reading "theological" books as a group - yes, we actually read them aloud together. We do this because there are often passages or paragraphs or sentences that we find we want to discuss right then and there. Sometimes we choose books that one might buy but not actually read (you may have a stack of those on your bedside table...). Sometimes the book we are reading references a book or an author that we feel might be interesting to explore further so we put that on our list for the future.

If you are a woman who thinks reading progressive Christian authors is something you might find interesting you would be welcome to join us. We meet nearly every Friday morning at 9:30. We check in with one another and usually begin reading at 10am. We break up around noon. We do not read fast and take our time looking up references as we go along. We take turns reading aloud so there is no "homework." Right now we are reading *The Universal Christ* by Richard Rohr.

Church Safety Challenge: Identify the Exits

Imagine you are in Fireside Lounge – where are all the exits? Yes, you can go outside near the library, out to the hall next to the bathrooms and out towards the kitchen. But did you notice or remember that there is an exit towards the west, under the apartment? It is less likely to be remembered or noticed because no one enters that way.

That is our tendency – to exit where we enter. In some emergencies, you may need to use a different exit. Your safety challenge this month is to identify all the exits for any room in which you attend a group gathering. At theaters, shopping centers, and other public spaces, make sure you know at least 2 ways to exit from any space. The one you are ignoring may be behind you. And whenever you stay in a hotel, actually read the little sign on the door, and make sure you could find your nearest exit, even if a hallway was full of smoke.

You can also help us keep this place safe by making sure we haven't let anything pile up in the way of our exits.

It is not the case that you should run out the door in every emergency, but you need to know where those doors are.

Be safe.

Presbyterian Men

Who are these "Presbyterian men"? Help solve the mystery. by Mimi Lange

This photo was recently found in the San Bernardino Feldheym Library's California Room *Shades of San Bernardino* photo collection, but except for the fact that it was in a folder with pictures of the old Presbyterian Church building, and a couple of pictures (dated 1954) of our present building, there was nothing to identify it. Dotti Garcia sent it to me.



I have been able to determine that the picture was taken between 1909 (which is the year the church building in the background was built), and 1926, which is when the Rev. Alvah Grant Fessenden, (seen standing in the second row directly behind the seated man with a cane), passed away. Rev. Fessenden was the pastor of First Presbyterian Church from 1908 until his death. Thanks to Marion Sischo's *A Century of Service:* A *History of the First United Presbyterian Church of San Bernardino, California* 1882-1982 for getting us that far.

We still don't know who any of the other gentlemen are, or why they gathered for a photograph. Do you recognize anyone? Do you have a copy of the photo in your family archives? The library would love to have more information. If you have any, please contact me at the church office, and I will pass your information along.

Of course, you can also contact the Feldheym Library directly, but please let me know if you do. I love a good mystery, but I like to know the solution, too!


