

Love and Legacy

There are many ways to make love visible, to make ministry happen, to make dreams come true. Many years ago, for example, Bill Leonard and Jim Huffstutler created the Leonard Scholarship Fund to honor Edie Leonard, and to equip generations of students with an education to empower them to serve the world that God loves.

The fund was invested wisely and this year, we noted that the original gift had grown so much that we were able (without diminishing available funds for scholars) withdraw enough funds to repair our leaking sanctuary roof! (about \$72,000!) So, Edie and her nephew Bill and his beloved Bobbie are gone, but their legacy of love remains, continuing to demonstrate the love and faith with which



they lived. It felt like a miracle to me, the urgency of the repairs and the amount of the estimate were so daunting- and then suddenly, a gift that preserves our beloved sanctuary!

Recently we received another legacy gift (Jim Huffstutler has written a profile in an accompanying article, which you should read next). The Andrews family who worshipped here years ago wrote us into their will. They made a charitable remainder trust, so both of their daughters had income and support, but when the second daughter died, the remaining funds came to us! I never met them, but I have given joyful and prayerful praise for their lives and their faith: new initiatives will be possible because of this gift- about \$420,000! Talk about astonishing- wow!

Just imagine what healing and hope and transformation this will make possible- Love will be shared, suffering ameliorated, young adults lifted up, elders cared for! A hand-made and home-grown miracle.


Tom and I have included First Pres in our plans, and you may want to do the same- what joy you will cause, what gladness you will create- and how you will delight the heart of God!

Herb and AnnaJane were active when I arrived at the church in 1963. Herb had a great sense of humor and a great voice, which Gloria Allen noticed and cast him in the first Chancel Players Production of "Everyman." I think AnnaJane was a secretary at First Congregational Church. They lived on either Glendenning Way or Bernard Way in a small home which had been decorated by their adopted daughter, Cyndi, who went on to be a decorator residing in Cathedral City. When they died, they left their estate, through the Presbyterian Foundation to FPC with the proviso that Cyndi would be free to draw upon it as she needed. I wasn't aware of the size of the estate, but I knew it was considerable -- and would have changed over the years. I told Cyndi to enjoy it! Cyndi had an interest in Wedgewood China and was the head honcho for a collectors group in the desert; this group wrote an obituary tribute on the web to Cyndi, who never married. Cyndi recently died, and the gift of Herb and AnnaJane has now come full circle, returning to the church, the gift of a family who deeply loved First Presbyterian Church.

- an affirmation that God has drawn near to us by taking on flesh and experiencing what it is to be human
- * a plea for God to draw closer to us and to the spaces in the world that are broken
- * a charge for us to draw near to God by leaning into wonder, justice, truth, and one another.

Advent 1 | Draw Near to Wonder (Luke 21:25-36)

Advent 2 | Draw Near to Truth (Luke 3:1-6; Luke 1:67-79; Philippians 1:3-11)

Advent 3 | Draw Near to Justice (Luke 3:7-18; Zephaniah 3:14-20)

Advent 4 | Draw Near to One Another (Luke 1:39-45, 46-55; Psalm 80:1-7)

ABOUT THE LOGO

The words "Draw" and "Near" literally draw near to one another and represent the landscape of heaven and earth becoming one. Within the shapes of the letters, a midnight sky blurs into green earth connected by a horizon of starlight.

This merging of heaven and earth symbolizes the kingdom of God drawing near to us in Christ. The style of the font has a touch of whimsy and old character, reminding us of the manuscript of a fairy tale. Likewise, Advent is a warm and familiar story that we return to year after year.

Christmas Eve: Let There Be Light

December 24 at 5:00 we will welcome the Christ Child with a service of readings and carols. This will be a highly participatory service with choir, processions, mangers, candles, and silent night on the patio.



This Advent and Christmas, we are Drawing Near to God (and wonder, truth, justice, and one another) using material from A Sanctified Art, a group of artists, poets, and preachers who create beautiful liturgy. We are using their art, poetry, and liturgy each worship service. There are additional materials in a **devotional guide**. 
Mariners Reminders

Mariners are planning to have our annual Valentine's Lunch in February 2020. The date and more information will be coming in the near future. Thank you for your continued support.


Prebyterian Women in the Congregation

Gerry Atkins joined First Pres July 11, 1950. She transferred from the Presbyterian Church in Brawley, where she had served as organist during her last two years of high school. She has been an Elder and a Deacon, and she has sung in the choir since 1988.

Pilgrimage

Labyrinth

On September 24th Brad and I embarked on a pilgrimage in France - Portals to the Sacred, led by Jeff Gaines who many know through Companions on the Inner Way. We spent 4 days prior sightseeing in Paris, but were quickly encouraged to differentiate between being a tourist and a pilgrim and allow these experiences to create new colors to add to the kaleidoscope of our lives. We joined a group of 14 others, which included 4 leaders who had led these groups for many years. We spent approximately 3 days each in Vezelay, Cluny, Dijon and Chartres with most of the time focused on the beautiful basilicas, cathedrals churches (and learning difference of each). We traveled in two vans, getting to know each other during the various activities which included gettogethers, guided tours and delicious dinners. There was well placed free time, lovely small hotels, quaint restaurants and so many new things to see and experience. In addition to visiting lovely churches, we tasted mustard, gingerbread, chocolate, cassis and wine! We had a wonderful dinner at the home of a couple in Dijon who hosts this group whenever they are there. The husband was born in the home 81 years earlier – it has been in his family for several centuries.

The first day we had a commissioning service in a private chapel at the Basilica of St. Mary Magdalene where we were each given a medallion to wear and blessings for the journey. We were greeted at breakfast each day with a prayer card to prepare us for the day's activities, as well as contemplation ideas for the various places we visited along the way. One of the many highlights was visiting Fontenay, a restored Cistercian Abbey which is a UNESCO Heritage Site. The grounds were beautiful and we had time to contemplate the lives of monks who lived there 200 years ago. Throughout the trip we were amazed at the stories of the adversity so many experienced during those times. anticipated visit to Taizé (we sing many of the Taizé chants in worship) did not disappoint. We attended three services representing the crucifixion resurrection which are repeated every Friday night was Prayer weekend. around the Cross where hundreds of youth from around the world make their way forward on their knees to touch and pray around the cross laid in the center of the room. Saturday evening was the Service of Light with lighting of candles throughout the room and Sunday Eucharist celebrates the risen Christ! On Sunday we had a simple meal followed by a meeting with Brother Pedro, one of the brothers of the Taizé community. In Dijon we gathered in the domed Crypt at St. Bénigne where we were treated with renaissance music sung by a professional opera singer and her mother. Another highlight was a visit to Chartres Cathedral which is a beautiful example of Gothic architecture. During the warmer months, Chartres has a light show called The Illuminations in which 29 sites throughout the city are lit up in splendid colors. The Cathedral was among the most amazing! We also were fortunate to be there on Friday where the inside labyrinth is revealed and available to walk. It is amazing to hear about the architecture from so many years ago - all precisely planned with purpose. Chartres the beautiful rose stained glass window would lay across the labyrinth if that wall was laid over the floor. Back in Paris, we worshipped at St. Gervais (the 'mother house' for the Community of Jerusalem who cares for the Basilica of St. Mary Magdalene where we started our pilgrimage). Although the service was in French, we had an English version of the scriptures and were welcomed. One touching moment was a Sister making her way down the aisle and tapping two of our group on the shoulder and asking them to follow her. A few minutes later, these two walked up the aisle carrying the communion elements to the altar, followed by children - there wasn't a dry eye among our group!

I think if there is one impression I have from this trip it is that we all have so much more in common than differences. From the books in the restaurant stop along the highway about stress, high blood pressure, etc. to the inclusiveness we felt at that last church service, it gives me hope for the future. It was very interesting to experience this type of trip through the eyes of a pilgrim rather than a tourist. It is one I hope to experience again!


