"I was glad when they said to me, let us go to the house of the Lord!"

We have been saying this each week as we have gathered once again in our sanctuary. We are glad to be together. We are glad to be surrounded by familiar symbols. We are glad to hear the choir sing (though we still long to sing ourselves). We are also glad to be continuing to meet with our community through livestream. We can be together and we can be welcoming to all in whatever way we can gather.

On **Sunday**, **July 25**, we had our first baptism in 2 years. We gathered around the Morales family as Pastor Sandy baptized Eli. On **Sunday**, **August 1**, we will celebrate communion in person for the first time since March 2020. We are using pre-packaged elements. We will invite those

attending to come forward, take a cup, return to your seats, and receive the elements together. Those who are attending online are invited to prepare elements and join in. We are glad to celebrate the sacraments.



On **Sunday, August 8,** we will focus on education and pray for those-students, teachers, administrators, and others--going back into schools and classrooms, some for the first time since March 2020. We are glad!

Our Story in a time of Change

My favorite questions are the kind that keep coming back to me, that stir in me things I cannot quite answer. "What do you think the strengths of this church are?" is one of those, posed by elder Margaret Doane as an idea for this newsletter piece. Such a good question. It has been provoking me for weeks! Then I read an article by Diana Butler Bass saying that for the first time in 40 years, mainline churches appear to be growing, while white evangelical churches have been declining. She sees this as a major shift, and says,

"When a major religious shift is underway, there's nothing more important than to tell your story. The people who are brave enough to walk in your doors or spend time reading your website can't read your mind and don't remember the former pastor or the beloved member who died twenty years ago. They don't want to know when the building was renovated or who donated the windows. Your story isn't a timeline - it is about the spirit of community, what motivates you, where you find meaning, your hopes and fears and gifts."

So what is our story, the spirit of our community? Here are a few thoughts...

We are people who believe that the Holy One is alive and at work here and now: in the whispered knowings of our hearts, in the joy we feel working shoulder to shoulder, in the sense of we have of being guided as a community.

Our faith is active- our faith is not just something we Believe, but something we Do- we try to live as followers of Jesus. We practice what we preach. We care for each other, certainly, we also aim to love folks who are not members of our community because we believe God loves them and has called us to do the same.

We understand that all ministry is reciprocal- When we serve others, we do not believe we are 'helping the less-fortunate', but discovering that, as St. Francis said, "it is in giving that we receive".

All are welcome here- we welcome all, just as Jesus has welcomed us. As guests or friends or members, whatever your spiritual background or human condition.

Willing to try new things- We have long & cherished traditions (love for the arts, celebration of the liturgical year, lifelong learning). We also trust that sometimes God wants to do "a new thing"! We work to trust God and each other, and to experiment (and even fail!), then pivot and try again. The pandemic has actually strengthened this quality.

Make Your Faith Visible

In March of 2020 when everything shut down, we wondered how to continue to be a church. Many of our volunteers were in the most at-risk group for Covid: those over 65.

We improvised, leaning heavily on our high school interns who turned out to be a great resource, we also called on members who were under 65 and we reconfigured and reshaped many of our practices.

Now, as many of us are vaccinated and we are beginning to be gather again, we find we are in real need of volunteers! Would you like to feel more connected to this congregation? Might God be calling you to make a contribution? We will, in the coming weeks, need volunteers for

Assistance in the Office+ Assistance with Fellowship Hour (set up, clean up)+ Assistance with Food Ministry (several different tasks available)+ Choir (if you are fully vaccinated)+ ushering on Sunday mornings+ safety team members + lectors/lay readers for worship+ folks who can provide breakfast items for LifeSkillz+ receptionists in the office+ Tech Crew for worship (once a month or so) take video, learn to run the livestream video set-up, run the sound board.

Some of these tasks are on weekdays, others in the evening or on Sundays. Some can be done periodically (once a month or once a quarter or once a year), others require more regular commitment. Please call the church office if you are interested, we are compiling lists of people who are willing, and then equip them to do their tasks. If there is something you would like to do that is not listed, please contact us!

Saint Teresa of Avila said this "Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which he looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which he blesses all the world." Friends, let us be the people of God!

Beware of Scams

Dishes

As we re-enter our buildings and resume some of our in-person gatherings, we need to make some adjustments. Many of us have become accustomed to leaving dirty dishes in the dishwashing room assuming that someone on staff will wash them.

In order to cut costs last year, we reduced our facilities staffing by 8 hours per week (about 17%), which means there are fewer staff hours available for all sorts of things: cutting grass, sweeping floors, blowing leaves, and... washing dishes. Please do your part by washing your own dishes when you can, and if you are uncertain, check with the office in advance of your event to determine whether we can provide dishwashing services or not.

Generally using real dishes and washing them in a commercial machine saves water and money and keeps things out of the landfill. However, using a commercial machine for just a few items is not so effective- it would be better for Creation if we washed them by hand.

We can figure this out!

If you receive an unexpected message from one of us asking you to do this, please delete it and report the incident to the church office. If you are ever unsure if a particular email is actually from a member of our staff, please verify with a phone call to the staff person or to the church office.

What happens when I give to the Endowment Fund? Marion Sischo, Music and Worship go on

When someone chooses to make a gift to the Endowment, it enables the church to do things that would not be possible otherwise.

Marion Sischo was a member of First Presbyterian Church. She was also a musician, a writer, and a lover of the arts. She played the cello. She sang alto with the Bloomington Women's Club Choral Section. She was a teacher and Music Director of Colton Public Schools. She was one of seven siblings. She wrote a history of this church from the founding to 1982. (She was born in

1904, and she died in 2003. She spent her life creating and encouraging beauty and giving glory to God.

An endowment fund was created in Marion's name, the Marion Sischo Music and Worship Fund, and it has done so many things through the years:

- It paid for improvements and repairs to our pipe organ.
- It paid for musicians in lean years when we could not otherwise have had the brass musicians at Christmas and Easter.
- It paid for the choir folders that our choir uses today.
- It has financed guest preachers and artists to enhance our worship.
- It built the sound booth at the back of the sanctuary.
- It has purchased sound equipment for our worship services.

It helped to pay for our videography and livestreaming as we have had to learn to do church a little differently—and helped us to include those who cannot attend physically in our worship services!

So when you hear William playing the organ, when you watch worship services you are unable to attend, when you are able to hear the pastor preach and the choir sing, when the music in our services stirs your heart and soul, remember Marion Sischo with thanks for the gifts of a life well-lived, and a legacy that continues giving to our church today.
