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Pastor's Page

Meet Mrs. C!

You may have heard the sermon on 11/28 in which I said that for many months we've been clearing out the Child Care Center rooms and cleaning closets and shelves. We've peeled and patched and sanded and painted, removed adhesive and replaced window coverings and light bulbs. These are inherently hopeful acts- they allow us to say to God "what's next?" and to be ready when the Spirit moves.

At the November Session meeting, your session approved a lease to begin Jan 1 of our child care center office. The lessee will be Jennifer Carter (known to kids as "Mrs. C"). She is the owner and operator of two child care centers: the Oak Tree Learning Center on 40th St in San Bernardino and Oak Tree View Park on Slauson Ave in Downtown Los Angeles. She has an educational consulting business and hosts a podcast: "Mrs.C's Podcast for Parents, Teachers and Administrators". She has also authored curriculum that builds social skills, emotional resilience, and academic preparedness.

Part of her vision as an educator is to work to address problems that plague neighborhoods with high rates of poverty and limited resources. She is interested in what high quality Early Childhood Education can do to help students thrive educationally, and is intentional about equipping parents to support schools and appropriately advocate for their children. She is intentional about building partnerships and collaborations. She has more than 25 years experience in classrooms and is smart, engaging, and passionate.



To begin with, she will install a phone line and hire a staff person to work in the office (Rm 7). For several months she will pursue licensing (the office is running about 6 months behind in processing applications at the moment), greet inspectors, advertise for and interview staff, and work at visibility to build enrollment. We hope the new school will open in early fall beginning with an infant room. The need is great according to staff at Head Start- many local center-sized schools have closed in the pandemic and have not re-opened.

The rooms will again be used to nurture children, and expand their lifelong capacity for learning, which surely delights the heart of God! The asset of a great child care center will again exist in our neighborhood. The new Center will pay modest rent to the congregation, which will make our financial outlook brighter. And she hopes to build a relationship with folks at First Pres as appropriate. We are excited to build a new partnership and to be involved again in ministry with small children

Appreciation for the First Pres Food Ministry

As we give out food every Tuesday and Thursday from 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM, the people we serve express their appreciation. Some include specifics of why they are grateful, and so we get a glimpse into their lives and the lives of their families. We invite you to hear the thanks of just a few of the people served by your food ministry.

The Veteran: This young man is always so thankful to the church provides. He was severely wounded in Afghanistan and spent many months in a VA hospital and he is still recovering from his psychological wounds. He is not always able to come during the hours our Food Giveaway is normally giving out food because he has started taking college classes and he is in class on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. We always make sure he has food when he needs it.

The Grandfather: This gentleman's income is usually enough to take care of himself, his wife and their two younger kids. Periodically his son, his son's wife and their small child must move in with them. That's when he needs assistance with food. To him, family is everything. He is always so grateful to the church for being able to get some food his family needs.

Woman on the Street: When we first met this woman it was difficult for her to say much more than her name. She has been on the streets for a long time. I can't even imagine the horrors she has had to endure. We have watched her improve over time and she will talk with us now. She knows First Pres is a safe place to come and get the food she needs. It has taken time, but we have earned a small amount of her trust. She says thank you and occasionally we will get a smile out of her.

One of My Heroes: We have an older woman who comes to pick up food for herself and for her friend, who is disabled. She is always so thankful the church Food Ministry is here to help her and her friend. Even though she has several medical issues of her own, she will pick up the food in her car, drive to her friend's apartment and carry the food into her apartment and put it away for her. If the bags are too heavy, she will make extra trips from her car to the apartment. She sometimes stays with her friend and they make lunch together and talk during lunch. This is what it means to be a friend.

What a privilege to share in the lives of the people we serve. Even when very sad, these stories reveal that these people are brave enough to ask for help and have the heart to help others. They are children of God.

Where Two or Three are Gathered

Neighbors, friends, and family members often come together for food ministry. That happens with volunteers who use less busy times to catch up. It happens with Saturday participants who carpool together, or come early to chat with each other. It is visible to those who register participants and load food as designated alternates pick up food for a family member, a neighbor, a person they care for professionally, or a home-bound friend.

On the sobering side, these are reminders of common barriers even to receiving free food – lack of transportation, isolation, disability. On the joyful side, the folks who pick up for others extend our ministry of compassion to folks in dire need in ways we could not do by ourselves.

As we enter the Advent season of waiting, expectancy, and hope, we will consider our personal and congregational provision to our neighbors in our Advent worship series, the Inn (summarized in the November newsletter). Our Tuesday/Thursday food distribution brings us one such story.

Grandma picks up food for her family and her daughter's family. Her daughter is staying home with a child because she can't clear more money than childcare costs. So there isn't any extra, but Grandma can help bring the food. This daughter is now anticipating a new baby. This time a boy. **Baby J's due date is the day of Christmas.**

What will Baby J's life be like? How will we share in the joys and struggles of this amazing gift? Maybe...

- ... Baby J, his mom, and his grandma will be nourished by our food pantry.
- ... Grandma will nurture his kindness and bring him along when she goes to that brick church.
- ... When Baby J needs a preschool, a new sustainable childcare program will be in place and Mom will be able to add to the household income.
- Teen J will attend SBHS, practice respectful communication, make deep friendships, and meet caring adults.
- Maybe Teen J will someday have fun as an intern putting groceries in the car of a neighbor who is picking up for another...

And J will smile.
