

The Music Box

In the official Gospels, when Pilate famously asks Jesus "What is Truth?" no reply from Jesus is recorded. In the Gospel of Nicodemus, however, a 4th century 'gospel' that didn't make the cut for the official New Testament, Jesus replies! Here is the passage:

(3:2) Jesus answered: "My kingdom is not of this world; for if my kingdom were of this world, my servants would fight in order that I should not be given up to the Jews: but now my kingdom is not from here." Pilate said to Him: "Are you then a king?" Jesus answered him: "You say that I am a king. Because for this have I been born, and have I come, in order that every one who is of the truth might hear my voice." Pilate says to him: "What is truth?" Jesus says to him: "Truth is from heaven." Pilate says: "Is truth not upon earth?" Jesus says to Pilate: "You see how those who speak the truth are judged by those that have the power upon earth."

One of the great triumphs in human history has been the steady progress of Scientific Truth in the last few centuries. A key feature of Science is that it concerns itself with the observable and measurable physical world. Scientific theories are tested against observations of physical phenomena. Indeed, the apex of Science is the 'repeatable experiment,' when other scientists can reproduce a scientist's experiment in their own laboratories.

"Scientific Historical Truth" is not quite the same. Consider how the cosmos came into being, or how life arose on earth. We can't 'repeat' those events — we can't roll back the clock and watch the Big Bang or the dinosaurs. We have to infer events in the past using our understanding of the physical world today. To me that seems fairly trustworthy 'truth', but not quite as trustworthy as a repeatable experiment.

"Historical Truth" more generally is even less reliable: we know there was a Julius Caesar by historical accounts written by ancient historians. But those can be problematic too — where does historical accuracy leave off and mythology begin? Even in our own day it's hard to know the truth about current well-known people and events. The passage of centuries and millennia only makes the problem worse.

All of these types of 'truth' are concerned with describing the external, physical world — past and present. But science and history tell me nothing about how to live my life, or how to treat my fellow humanity.

One might say this is the province of Philosophy. But if this is the job of Philosophy, it has failed miserably after 2500 years of effort. Chris Daly, Professor of Philosophy at the University of Manchester observes:

Philosophy seems to be on a hiding to nothing. It has a 2,500-year history in the West and an extensive back-catalogue – of problems. There are questions about what exists, and what we know about it, such as: Do we have free will? Is there an external world? Does God exist? and so on. There are also questions of analysis and definition such as: What makes a sentence true? What makes an act just? What is causation? What is a person? This is a tiny sample. For almost any abstract notion, some philosopher has wondered what it really is.

Yet, despite this wealth of questions and the centuries spent tackling them, philosophers haven't successfully provided any answers. They've tried long and hard but nothing they've said towards answering those questions has quite made the grade. Other philosophers haven't been slow to pick holes in their attempted answers and expose flaws or dubious assumptions in them. The punctures in the attempted answers then get patched up and put up for discussion again. But what happens is that new punctures appear, or the patches fail and the old punctures are revealed again. Philosophy emerges as a series of arguments without end, and its questions settle into seemingly intractable problems.

So when Pilate says "What is Truth?", that remains a darn good question! The Gospel of Nicodemus records a reply: Jesus says: "Truth is from heaven." Maybe there's more truth to that than meets the eye. Maybe the Truths that guide our lives HAVE to come from outside of the system, from heaven, from God. Maybe because we're not capable of answering these questions on our own.
